



Lend me your Ears

PLAYWRIGHT-ACTOR PETER USTINOV is the exact reverse of that song popular some seasons back about the lady who preferred the gentleman who was there.

When it comes to his two professions—Ustinov prefers the one he's not engaged in at the moment. He does, however, admit, "Acting is rather easier. It's not easy to give a good performance. But it's easier to give a bad performance than to write a bad play." Whether the fact that he was an actor first influences his thinking on the subject, he doesn't say.

At any rate, Ustinov, who has the happy conversational faculty of coming up with amusing lines that could go right into his plays, started his career as a scrivener during the war, and had his first play, "House of Regrets" produced almost immediately—in London, in 1942. He gave the play to a famous writer of reviews (Herbert Farjeon), who was even after three months "extremely evasive about it." Then I picked up the Sunday Times the day that Germany marched into Russia and started reading James Agate's column (he was the dean of drama critics, sort of an English George Jean Nathan) and he was talking about this new dramatist. I was very envious and I was about halfway down the column before I realized it was I. Somebody bought the option in New York on the basis of the notice. It was never done there, but I had 100 pounds to live on, which made a difference. Then I was a private."

Although Ustinov has written 12 plays, the actor hasn't taken too many of the playwright's parts. The first one was the role of the Wicked Fairy in "The Love of Four Colonels." This is the role that Rex Harrison took in the American production, which, says Ustinov, was cut considerably. They phoned him from the States to consult re the cuts, but he recalls, "all I heard was the Atlantic. First Rex saying 'hello, Peter,' then gloop, gloop, gloop." He didn't find out exactly what the cuts were until sometime later. "Opus 1" and "Opus 2"—"Romano and Juliet," in which he will play a part, and "The Empty Chair," which is being done by the Old Vic company, will open in England this spring.

The actor-actor is busy here winding up "I Girovaghi" (originally "Cardello") in which he's been shooting down in Sicily. He had to grow a beard for the film—"The same beard I grew for 'Quo Vadis' but the producers said it didn't look real so I had to wear a false one." And one day in Taormina, wearing the ragged clothes of the Sicilian peasant, he plays in the film—and with beard—he went in to a library to buy the London Daily Telegraph. Two tourists wearing rimless glasses ("you know those octagonal ones. The glasses that pretend they're not there and transform a whole face") saw him. One said to the other: "I can't get over how primitive these people are. They're way behind the times. I just want to extend the hand of

friendship to them." At this point he boomed out "in a loud and senatorial voice: (I tried to get a sort of garbled timbre). Has my Rome Daily American come in yet?" But Ustinov adds, "I felt guilty immediately afterwards, because I had obviously spoiled their holiday."

Ustinov's wife, Suzanne Cloutier, is also in the acting business, although at the moment she's expecting their second child—any minute. Their first youngster, Pavla, now 20 months, is a little too young for the stage. "But not too young to talk on the phone. Pavla, born in Los Angeles, travels on an American passport; his wife has a Canadian one, and Ustinov's is English, a situation which frequently drives customs and border officials crazy."

Strip Teaser, Sugar Heir Get Tax Bills

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 17 (AP)—Sugar heir John D. Spreckels III, strip teaser Lili St. Cyr and movie actor Eric von Stroheim all have been billed by the U.S. government for back income taxes.

Spreckels, who had his name changed to John D. Smith, last December, owes \$10,843.16 on his 1940 income. So says a lien filed with the county recorder. Spreckels or Smith told the judge who approved the name change that he is paying \$25 a month in back income taxes.

He is a salesman for a brother who operates a custom cabinet shop in Seattle.

Another claim said Miss St. Cyr owes \$4,391.65 for 1954.

The lien against Von Stroheim asks \$8,760.49 on his 1949 income and gives his address as care of 65 Champs Elysees, Paris.

Good News Letter Ends 'Honor' Trial

TRENT, Italy, Feb. 17 (AP)—A letter from the Italian Defense Ministry yesterday ended a trial which an elderly couple, Emma and Osvaldo Maffei, started against a neighbor for "reasons of honor."

The letter said the couple's missing son, a soldier on the Russian front during World War II, was known to be alive in southern Russia. The parents had not heard of him since 1942.

They immediately dropped the legal action. "We cannot embitter this day with a trial," they said.
